FROM THE PASTOR

Ecclesiastes 3

For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven:

- a time to be born and a time to die;
- a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted;
- a time to kill and a time to heal;
- a time to break down and a time to build up;
- a time to weep and a time to laugh;
- a time to mourn and a time to dance;
- a time to throw away stones and a time to gather stones together;
- a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing;
- a time to seek and a time to lose;
- a time to keep and a time to throw away;
- a time to tear and a time to sew;
- a time to keep silent and a time to speak;
- a time to love and a time to hate;
- a time for war and a time for peace.

Transitions, change, grief, and joy...

You might know I've been singing with PLU's Choral Union these past many years. This year, our conductor of 32 years retired from the group. The focal point of our last concert (click if you want to listen!) was Daniel Knaggs' "To Everything, a Season", a setting of the familiar Ecclesiastes text. The seasons of our ensemble were illuminated in the segments of the concert: the founder of the group (and my undergrad conductor) visited to conduct the beginning of the program, the conductor taking over next year took the middle of the concert, and our retiring conductor saw us to the end. The seasons of music were highlighted as we sang pieces from an 1878 mass followed by a lot of 20th and 21st century music. At the end of the concert, all past members of the ensemble were invited to the stage to join us in singing "The Lord Bless You and Keep You" by Peter Lutkin. It was our way of recognizing all the musicians Dr. Nance has touched, as well as blessing Dr. Nance on his way.

This transition, as with any transition or change, brings grief. There's the grief (sadness) of saying goodbye to someone who has been a significant part of our musical journey, for sure. There's also the joy of welcoming someone new. There's the grief (disappointment) of the new person not doing things the way we're used to. There's the joy of discovering new musical nuances. There's the grief (anxiety) of not quite knowing what to expect. There's the joy of the newness of Spring. Seasons change. Change always brings grief, even though we don't always recognize it as grief; and each new season has its joys.

We have similar transitions going on at PFLC, both as we seek to fill our two open staff positions and as we seek to follow the Spirit's call into ministries that are unfamiliar and might be a little uncomfortable. We trust that the Spirit will lead us both through the grief and into the joys of the new seasons of ministry.

There are also changes happening at the macro level of church: fewer people attending onsite, fewer dollars in the offering plate, fewer pastors accepting the call to serve congregations, more and more work to do in the world. The seasons of ministry are changing, and we lament the loss of the ministries we grew up with, the ministries we find comforting, the ministries we are used to.

And we live into our new life in Christ, a resurrection life! Jesus does not promise this new life will be free from grief, only that grief never gets the last word. There's always resurrection, there's always joy.

I can't say this often enough: all change, however small or large, causes grief. We don't always recognize it as grief, we don't always acknowledge that it's happening. But it manifests itself in our bodies, it changes our emotional baseline, it affects the way we think. Some may tell you to focus on the joy, and that's a good thing, but we also need to focus on the grief and how it is affecting us – body and soul – and not just ignore it or wish it away. We don't need to wallow in it; we need to admit the humanness of it.

As we do this, there are things we can do to reorient ourselves to our new situations:

- 1. Dwell in the Word. Jesus knows grief. Jesus also brings hope and joy, gathers and sends us, and loves us without limits.
- 2. Learn. In my experience, nothing makes us more adaptable to the changes life throws at us than continuing to learn throughout our lives. It even makes our brains more adaptable, more elastic!! See the justice pages and the PLU pages in this newsletter for expansive learning opportunities. Check out the justice information rack in the narthex or look at the websites, novels, and other things that were formative for PFLC's Sacred Justice Working Group.
- 3. Talk with others who are experiencing the grief and joys of transitions. Talk to Evelyn Levey for insights from her Transitions Group of a few years ago. Talk to a professional counselor. Listen to those with wisdom to share.
- 4. Read novels that come from a point of view unfamiliar to you. The beauty of literature is that it can expand our worldview far more than our insular lives ordinarily allow!
- 5. Pay attention to your body and what it is telling you about the changes you're going through. Be gentle with yourself and others. Love yourself God does!

The Spirit is so very active among the people at PFLC. We grieve, and we rejoice with the transitions the Spirit brings. And through it all, we walk together.

Falling in Love with God and Neighbor (continued from May) Building beloved community with Stephanie Spellers

Stephanie offered a wealth of insights for church leaders seeking to foster renewal and creative witness in challenging times:

Reimagine Evangelism

For many mainline churches, evangelism can feel uncomfortable or manipulative. Stephanie offered a fresh definition: "We seek, name, and celebrate Jesus' loving presence in the stories of all people... and then we invite everyone to more."

This approach emphasizes curiosity, humility, and joy. "The most amazing practice of evangelism is simply looking around your neighborhood, your community, your family, and when you see people doing something that looks like God, say so," Stephanie shared.

This reimagined approach to evangelism aligns closely with the Christian tradition of seeking and serving Christ in all persons. By focusing on recognizing and celebrating God's presence in people's lives, it removes the pressure of having to "convert" others and instead creates opportunities for genuine connection and spiritual conversation. Stephanie noted that this approach often surprises people, opening doors for deeper dialogue about faith and meaning.

Integrate Reconciliation and Creation Care

Stephanie explained how evangelism, reconciliation, and creation care flow from the Great Commandment to love God and neighbor. "These ministries, these commitments to evangelism, reconciliation, creation care, are really how we live out that great commandment," she said.

This integrated approach allows churches to engage in environmental and justice work as an expression of Christian faith and practice.

By connecting these areas of ministry to the core Christian call to love, Stephanie offers a theological framework that can help churches move beyond siloed programs to a more holistic, mission-driven approach. This integration can energize congregations by demonstrating how environmental stewardship and social justice work are integral expressions of Christian discipleship, rather than optional add-ons.

Nurture Small Group Communities

While many churches focus primarily on Sunday worship, Stephanie emphasized the importance of small groups for sustainable discipleship. "You're not going to be able to necessarily live this way of love, this Jesus-centered life if you're just going to church periodically," she noted.

Stephanie also emphasized the importance of intentionality in small group formation. "We need each of us to get a pattern of some kind," she explained, referring to the Way of Love practices. Small groups provide an ideal setting for establishing and maintaining these patterns of discipleship. By creating spaces where people can regularly pray together, study scripture, share their faith journeys, and hold one another accountable, churches can foster a deeper sense of community and spiritual growth. These groups can also serve as incubators for new leaders and ministries, as participants discover and nurture their gifts in a supportive environment.



Lead with Vulnerability and Joy

Stephanie highlighted the importance of leaders' own spiritual lives in fostering congregational renewal. "When the leader's heart has been broken open and the leader is yearning for more of God, and the leader is sharing those stories... People so often we'll come back and say, that's what we've been waiting for."

This insight highlights the critical role of pastoral leadership in church renewal. Stephanie's emphasis on leaders sharing their own spiritual journeys and longings for God can create a culture of authenticity and growth within congregations. By modeling vulnerability and joy in their own faith lives, leaders can inspire and empower their communities to engage more deeply with their own spiritual formation.

As churches navigate an increasingly polarized cultural landscape, Stephanie encouraged leaders to stay rooted in the "gospel of love" rather than seeking to win arguments. By speaking truth in love and inviting others into deeper relationship with God and neighbor, churches can offer a powerful witness in these challenging times.

THE RED CARD

"The red card is a list of legal rights for immigrants who might find themselves targeted by federal agents and lists practical tips for legally protecting and exercising those rights. They can slide it under a door to agents or show it through a window."

The card can be found at the Immigrant Legal Resource Center website and printed at home in multiple languages for free. You can also find some in the Justice rack in the narthex.

I do not wish to speak with you, answer your questions, or sign or hand you any documents based on my 5th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution.

I do not give you permission to enter my home based on my 4th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution unless you have a warrant to enter, signed by a judge or magistrate with my name on it that you slide under the door.

I do not give you permission to search any of my belongings based on my 4th Amendment rights.

I choose to exercise my constitutional rights.

He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." - Luke 10:27 (NRSV)

For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." - Galatians 5:14 (NRSV)
